CONVENTION RULES

Welcome to Windycon 44. This is our tenth year here at the Westin and they are quite pleased to have us back and we love to be here. We ask that you continue to respect the facility and its employees.

Remember to be nice to others and treat everyone as you would like to be treated. The convention reserves the right to revoke your membership with no refund for disrupting the convention or breaking any rules and policies, and the spirit thereof, as well as causing trouble of any sort. If it's illegal in Illinois or Lombard, it is illegal at the convention.

Here are a few rules you need to be aware of:


- 1. You must have your badge with you at all times in order to enter or stay in any convention function.
- 2. You must present your badge to any member of the staff, including our door guards, who request it.
- 3. A lost badge may be replaced at Registration for the cost of an at-the-door badge.
- 4. No real weapons or anything that can be mistaken for one can be carried on premises. Costume and prop weapons must be approved by operations and convention security and, if necessary, be peace bonded.
- 5. Energy weapons are restricted to only visible light lasers (400-700 nm) of up to 1 mW continuous wave
- 6. Any weapons purchased in the dealers' room, real or not, must be taken from the dealers room to your room or to operations for approval if you wish to carry it.
- 7. No projectile instruments of any kind. Not real, not Nerf, nothing.
- 8. No open live steel period. It must be sheathed and be approved by and peace bonded by Operations/Security.
- 9. If you wish to use a weapon in the masquerade you must clear it with the masquerade director and transport it directly to the event and then directly back to your room afterwards.

- 10. Anything used as a weapon in any threatening manner, whether real, real looking, prop, toy, or otherwise, will result in its confiscation and possibly the revocation of your membership without refund.
- 11. Windycon reserves the right to prohibit any weapon, real or not, at its sole discretion.
- 12. If you damage the hotel, you will pay to fix it.
- 13. A costume must not leave bits of itself behind. This especially goes for things that would damage the hotel including, but not limited to: blood, body parts, dripping gore, ichor, brains, eyes, internal organs, external organs, or anything else that might fall off.
- 14. Our venue has a restriction allowing only dogs on the property; no cats, rats, spiders, snakes, ferrets, birds, unicorns, etc. are allowed. If you have a dog accompanying you, you must take it from your room for its walk and then back to your room. The only exception are dogs who are also service animals, meaning they have been trained in obedience and task skills to meet the needs of a disabled person. If you bring your service animal into convention space, please make certain you have checked it in with Operations and received a free Service Animal Badge, and they are wearing it al all times. Also please be sure they is properly harnessed and identified according to the relevant statutes.
- 15. Smoking is prohibited by local law and ordinance within the convention facilities. There are designated areas with the appropriate refuse bins for those who wish to indulge outside. Please respect those not wishing to indulge with you and keep the specified distance away from the doors.

Windycon and ISFiC reserves the right revoke the membership of anyone failing to conform to the letter and spirit of these policies, those of our hotel, and the laws of the City of Lombard and the State of Illinois.

If there are any questions you can direct them to Operations. We hope you have a wonderful time at the convention.

WELCOME TO ISFIC

Congratulations, you are a member of ISFiC, one of Chicago's oldest science fiction organizations. So, what does that mean?

When you pay to join Windycon, you're actually joining ISFiC, the organization that runs Windycon and continues to have a presence throughout the rest of the year. Your membership in ISFiC allows you to attend other ISFiC events.

In 1962, Chicago fandom brought the world together for the twentieth World Science Fiction Convention, known variously as Chicon II or Chicon III. After that event, which boasted a massive membership of 550 people, Chicago fandom splintered. Although there were some fannish activities, such as Advent:Publishers or small get-togethers, Chicago fandom entered a period of dormancy.

ISFiC, Illinois Science Fiction in Chicago, was founded in the early 1970s by a group of science fiction fans who decided that it would be a good idea to get con-running experience so they could run a Worldcon. They later realized that this was a silly thing to do, but by that time, they had founded Windycon, a general science fiction convention held for the first time October 25-27, 1973 at the Blackstone Hotel in Chicago. Joe Haldeman and Lou Tabakow were the guests of honor and Bob Tucker served as toastmaster.

The original board of directors of ISFiC was made up of Larry Propp, Mark and Lynne Aronson, Ann Cass, Jon and Joni Stopa, and Mike and Carol Resnick. Under their early guidance, Windycon became an

annual event, with the Aronsons chairing the first three events before passing the chairmanship reins on to Larry Propp, who would use his knowledge to co-chair Chicon IV in 1982.

Although ISFiC was organized in part to help run conventions to give people experience for a Worldcon and bring Chicago fandom together, ISFiC has never actually run a Worldcon, leaving that activity up to individually created organizations.

So, what does ISFiC do when it isn't running Windycon?

After Chicon IV, ISFiC had successfully achieved the goal of building an ongoing committee that could run Windycon from year to year, at least as much as any local group can be said to. ISFiC thought about what could be done to make Windycon a better convention.

One factor in this was that Windycon's excess funds were starting to pile up. As a 501(c)3 corporation, ISFiC is supposed to use the excess funds for the benefit of fandom. So, rather than let the money pile up, ISFiC decided to put the money back into Windycon in creative ways.

One way was in providing grants to Windycon to bring in special guests over and above the normal guests of honor. In this manner, Windycon was able to compensate for the fact that most SF authors and editors live on the East and West Coasts. Once ISFiC started bringing in authors and editors, many liked Windycon so much that they have continued coming back on their own accord.

ISFiC looked further afield and also provided grants to other groups in Illinois that wanted to help increase the range, breadth, and depth of fandom. Other conventions, both in Chicagoland and downstate, came to ISFiC looking for either money or resources. ISFiC's charter made providing this assistance a key goal. Some of the other organizations that have benefited from ISFiC largesse include Chambanacon, Whatcon, Capricon, DucKon, Think Galacticon, and the Speculative Literature Foundation.

Not just financial assistance is given. In some cases, the Windycon art show hangings are rented for a nominal fee (to cover maintenance and upkeep costs). ISFiC is always interested in hearing from groups running Illinois conventions that have a specific project they would like some assistance with.

While ISFiC was running a convention in November, many of the people who ran the convention realized that even though they got to see fleeting glimpses of friends, their con-running duties kept them too busy to fully socialize. Looking for another excuse to get together for fannish camaraderie, and because there was no summer Chicago con at the time, in 1986, ISFiC created Picnicon, an annual picnic held in a variety of forest preserves and parks over the years. As a relaxacon, ISFiC provides the hamburgers, hotdogs, and grills and asks the attendees to drop a couple (literally) bucks in the hat and bring a side dish or dessert. Think of Picnicon as a massive outdoor con suite.

Also, in 1986, ISFiC elected to run an amateur writers contest, open to all members of ISFiC (Windycon), people living in Illinois or nearby Midwestern states. That first year, the contest was won by Richard Chwedyk, who would go on to become a professionally published author and winner of a Nebula Award. The ISFiC Writers Contest is held most years in conjunction with Windycon. The winner receives con membership, a cash award, and publication of their story in the ISFiC Program book.

In 2005, ISFiC created ISFiC Press. Each year, this arm of ISFiC publishes a hardcover book at Windycon, generally, but not always, by the Windycon author guest of honor with a cover by the Windycon artist guest of honor. ISFiC Press's first book, **Relativity**, by Robert J. Sawyer, received an Aurora Award, the Canadian National Award presented by fans. In addition, ISFiC Press has published unrelated science fiction novels and the Hugo Award-nominated **Worldcon Guest of Honor Speeches**.

The ISFiC board of directors has nine members, with three directors coming up for re-election each year for a three-year term. Any Illinois fan who is a member of ISFiC (see the first paragraph of this article) is eligible to be elected; come to the ISFiC board meeting at Windycon (held on Saturday afternoon) and nominate yourself. Meetings of the ISFiC board are normally held at Windycon and Capricon. The meetings are open to the public.

ISFIC HARASSMENT POLICY

Harassment of any kind is not tolerated. If someone tells you "no" or asks you to leave them alone, your business with them is done.

Your right not to be harassed is not a right not to be offended. All of us have different things that we find offensive. If you are offended, the best solution may be for you to walk away from the person who offends you. Should that person pursue you and continue to offend you, that could be harassment.

Unwanted physical contact is also not tolerated at Windycon. We understand that many fans view Windycon and other conventions as a safe space and enjoy greeting their friends with a hug, but please be aware that some people do not enjoy physical contact and if there is any question, please refrain from initiating physical contact with an individual. Similarly, a costume is not an invitation for physical contact.

If you feel that you are being harassed, or if you notice someone behaving inappropriately (such as violating hotel or convention policies), we respectfully suggest the following:

- * If you feel comfortable doing so, point out the inappropriate behavior to the person(s) involved. Often this will solve the problem immediately.
- * If you do not feel comfortable talking with the person(s) involved, or if talking to them does not resolve the issue, please report the situation immediately to any ISFiC/Windycon event coordinator (i.e., Windycon Operations, Security, the Windycon chair, Vice-chair, Members of the ISFiC Board, or Con Ombudsman).

It would be extremely helpful if you could provide a name, badge name/number, and/or physical description of the person(s) involved. Please remember that we need to know about any incidents during the event in order to take action.

SUI GENERIS: A TESTIMONY

(Written in 2008 as an intro to an omnibus edition of Rucker's four Ware novels.)

Genuinely sui generis novelists operate at an inherent disadvantage, and all the more so in any so-called genre.

Genre is that dubious bargain whereby the reader is offered (for our present purposes) a novel, a form whose very name promises a new experience, but offers, in genre, the implicit and crucial promise of the repetition of previous pleasures.


Rudy Rucker has never trafficked in that repetition, and while he unabashedly loves the genre in which he tends to be marketed, he transcends it, or perhaps engulfs it, in his singularity. You'll see this said about all too many science fiction writers, given novelty's supposed (and largely spurious, in my view) importance to the genre, but of Rudy it's quite literally true. He is one splendidly odd duck, balanced between pure mathematics on the one hand and spontaneous bop prosody on the other, while uncounted further hands (or paws, in some cases) flicker in from their individual Hilbert spaces, bearing cups, wands, alien sex toys, artifacts out of Roadrunner cartoons, terrible jokes, gleefully fell dooms, and lubricating dabs of mentholated ichor.

Scarily bright, and a card-carrying Holy Fool who's managed to fall off every cliff but the only really wrong ones, he used to frighten me.

In part, no doubt, because he's the only higher mathematician I've ever known, while I am myself virtually an innumerate. I knew from the very start of our acquaintance (from before, actually, as I read him before I met him) that he habitually, effortlessly, visited realms I was literally incapable of envisioning, let alone visiting. He also frightened me because, though generally convivial, he seemed to me to teeter atop an angelic pinhead of purest Random, causing me the constant apprehension that he might at any second do or say literally anything at all. As I was secretly attempting to negotiate my own life and literary career with the emergency brake on, this made me complexly uneasy. He seemed starry-eyed with the sheer joy of forgetting the brakes entirely.

I found him unsettling in another way as well, though that was not so much about him as about something we had in common. Being at least a decade older than the rest of our cyberpunk cohort, we were both veterans of (ahem) "the Sixties". Which was to say that we had once been somewhere very strange and new indeed, but that that tide had somehow receded, leaving us in some new but actually markedly unstrange iteration of

a world we had once expected to change utterly. Whenever I ran into Rudy, over the first decade or so of my career, I worried that we were both actually too old for this. But then I'd note the shiver of angelic pinhead-wobble, and in some paradoxical way be comforted thereby. ("And at the time," Rudy wrote to me recently, "I thought we were jaded roués!")

Before I read or met Rudy, I'd lived for several seasons in Washington, D.C., with a roommate who at some point went up to New York to see a great retrospective show of the Surrealists, kindly and hugely formatively bringing me the show's catalog as a gift. I had heard of Surrealism, but had never really put together what it was. That catalog became a sort of Rosetta Stone for me, a way of decoding and assembling a great many very diverse things that I had encountered in art and literature, things I had known were similar, in some way, but without really understanding how.

The capital-s Surrealism, Surrealism, was splendid stuff, but I now recognized a similar but lower-case impulse in virtually everything that had ever attracted me in the popular arts. I saw it in Mad Magazine (and particularly in its imitators), in Forrest J. Ackerman's gloriously cheesy Famous Monsters Of Filmland, in Rod Serling's The Twilight Zone, in Zap Comics. And I saw it, of course, in the prose science fiction I had grown up with: a folk surrealism, a street surrealism, entirely free of Breton's faux-papal excommunications and other tedious hi-jinx. It was, I saw, to certain forms of popular art, and most particularly to the flavors of science fiction that had worked best for me, the equivalent of the ethanol molecules in an alcoholic beverage. So I filed that one away, and went about my business, such as it was.

Later, encountering first the fiction and then its author, I took it instantly for granted that in Rudy Rucker I found an exemplar of that very thing, a natural-born American street surrealist, bordering at times on a practitioner of Art Brut.

Rudy's fiction has a much higher percentage of surrealism molecules than most fiction, science or otherwise. It has, as moonshiners say when they swirl whiskey in a glass, in order to closely observe how it settles back down the sides of the glass, "good legs". Rudy's fiction is probably a bit too strong, in that regard, for some readers, but even the hard stuff, let me assure you, is an enjoyably acquired taste.

And I'm no longer afraid of Rudy. We're both (even) older, and vibrate now at more authentically geezeroid frequencies. And I no longer feel that the world outside the window isn't as freaky as the ones we glimpsed back in the Sixties. It is. With bells on.

Now go and read Rudy Rucker, in the 21st century. Dude's sui generis. And has good legs.

of First Member that he has invited the distinguished Dr. Erica Neely to visit our glorious convention as our honored guest. There is a certain inherent irony as our utopian Windycon society examines the themes of dystopia; it is the music of Erica Neely that will help illuminate how fortunate we are to be guided by First Member.

Erica is a long-time member of the subculture in fandom known as "filkers", those who write and sing the music of science-fiction fandom. And since she first began filking as a student at Oxford, she has been most noted for two things: a beautiful voice and the number of dead, dying, or abjectly oppressed people in the songs that she has written. If there were, in fact, a contest to determine which filker had produced the highest body count, she would be at least a top-two finisher, if not the gold medalist.

It is through this examination of the human (and alien!) condition in these dystopian environments that we can purge ourselves of unworthy thoughts and understand our tremendous good fortune as we are shown the correct way by First Member. We are uplifted and inspired by the stories that Erica tells in song.

Not all of the protagonists in Erica's songs come to a bad end; as she observes, "Not Everybody Dies". And her music runs the gamut from serious to silly, and ventures off in unique directions as, for example, when she sings the filks she wrote of Steinbeck's East of Eden and Of Mice and Men.

Erica has, for some years now, worked as the Pegasus Evangelista, leading the committee for the Pegasus Awards which are voted on and given for excellence in filk annually at the Ohio Valley Filk Fest. This is a demanding job, especially when coordinating the annual nominees concert at the convention, where twenty nominated songs are sung by an ever-changing cast of performers.

She was inducted into the Filk Hall of Fame in 2009.

Like most filkers, Erica has a day job, where she uses her Ph.D. in Philosophy in both teaching and research. In her professional writing, she specializes in the philosophy of technology. One thread of her research deals with philosophical issues arising from video games, such as whether video games could develop our moral thinking. The other thread is on ethical issues that stem from emerging technologies such as augmented reality and 3D printing, this last leading to an article that was published in the Times Literary Supplement.

We are very fortunate to have her with us this weekend. Please be sure to come by to hear her concert and to see her panels and presentations – I expect that they will be fascinating.

I kind of figured this out the first day I met him. I was brand new at college and sweet on a particular girl I just met. I asked her what she was doing for fun that night and she told me she was going to play D&D...so I followed her like a puppy and saw a game that was as close to Monty Python's Flying Circus as I had ever experienced. I mean, they had a character named "George, the wonder elf". Seriously! The thing that made the game work so well was that it surely appeared that the point of the game was that the guy running it could think faster, and funnier, than you. Pretty much at all times. That's how I met David. Running a game, living by his wits, making life fun. I was booked.

internalizes games. He frequently knows the rules as good or better than the people that wrote them His understanding of games and how they work frequently lead him towards the deep, hidden knowledge in a game....not just of *what* makes the game fun, but also places where the game kind of breaks down. If David were the kindly gaming version of Santa Claus, he'd share that knowledge freely and all the little children would rejoice. But where is the fun in that?

You see, David pairs his deep understanding of games with the second strongest competitive drive I've ever

He plays games, all kinds of game...but "play" is such a bland term. Everyone plays games. David digests and

with the second strongest competitive drive I've ever encountered (several of us have let David know that some day we will tell him who the person is that's more competitive than he is). This competitive drive makes David the gaming version of an elite athlete. Way back when, I introduced David to a game that I loved called Battledroids (later, thanks to Lucasfilm, it was called Battletech). Even though I learned to play the game from folks who had helped write some of the rules....the second time we ever played, it was clear he was better than me. Not just that, he eventually demonstrated the ability to take a game that I would normally play for some fair number of hours on an afternoon and make me cry and resign in about 12 minutes. That's just one game. If it happened just the one time it would be an interesting note....but David has done something similar to that in nearly every game I've ever seen him take up.

Games are life for him, and that is part of why it was so awesome he's made a career of it.

Shortly after college we heard about a business that was opening up that was all about one of our favorite games. The Battletech Center. It was, at that point, a soon-to-open business where people could show up and pay money not to *just* play Battletech, but to dive into it virtually. To get inside a full scale cockpit simulator and drive a 10 meter tall walking tank with weapons beyond belief and bash heads with up to seven other people at the same time, each in their own cockpit simulator running their own walking tank. It was like Mecca for gamers. David and I both applied for jobs there. He got the job, I didn't, and it was the best for everyone.

In no time, David was the manager there. Then he was the manager that they would send to a new location being set up to hire and train a whole new staff for the new center. This sent him to locations all over, including San Diego, Montreal, and Japan. This lead to him being promoted to corporate and made part of the folks responsible for making the game, rather than just running the sites. This lead to the being purchased by Microsoft and moved to Seattle to work on games for the X-Box...and from there he's plied his trade continuously for a long time now. Working on many games. Helping design them, make missions, and keep them fun.

If you poll teenage gamers and ask them what they'd like their life to be...well, most of them would describe David's.



Of course, gaming is just the tip of the iceberg with David. When you get a chance to have a longer talk with him, you quickly find out that he's kind, caring, compassionate, loyal, smart as hell, quick witted, and has made one of the world's best families for himself (even if I do sporadically try to trade one of his children for a Tesla).

This weekend, David will be sharing a lot about his love for games and his knowledge of them. You could do a lot worse than showing up to hear some of what he has to say. When you do see him though, make sure you tell him that you ran into me earlier in the convention and I let you know who the guy that's more competitive than him is.

JUDI MILLER

FAN GUEST OF HONOR

Judi is a pleasure to watch, and when you talk about Judi that isn't the creepy kind of watching. She is a signer, well she is also a singer, a performer, and a wonderful person, but she won her Pegasus Award for Best Performer in 2006 for her sign language performances. This is a remarkable feat in a traditional vocal community. Judi has instilled an appreciation for the visual aspect of American Sign Language within concerts in the filk community within science fiction and fantasy conventions.

Dave Weingart says: "And it's not merely that she signs, but she does it in such a way that she brings out the emotion and feeling of a song and what people are saying (her sign for filk, for example, looks a lot like head banging air guitar)".

Judi's performances have spread far and wide on YouTube, accompanying many notable members of the filk community. The videos, while not only spreading filk, show that there is a place for other types of performance, within the community and beyond, besides just singing.

Judi teaches at a school for kids with many issues, some of whom are Deaf. She teaches in English and ASL to a mixed classroom. When asked if she uses filk in the class room she responded, "Absolutely. I use Tom Smith, Heather Dale, Vixy

and Tony, Brooke Lunderville, and Luke Ski, just off the top of my head. Some are intros to related works, like "Telly-Tale-y Heart," and Luke's "Hamlet." I use the Ropers' "Apology" as a reward for kids who correct me (and are right). Heather Dale gets used for ballads, Vixy and Tony's "Siren Song" as an inspiration for writing as a character from the Odyssey, as well as what types of humor. Brooke's song with the "Wrong Next Block In Tetris" teaches metaphor, paired with "My Love Is Like the Moon" for simile. And I do more, but I'd have to look back at my lesson plans to see what I did."

Judi has been a mainstay at Marcon, signing the Guest of Honor Concerts as well as others, for years. She officially became part of the program in 2005, signing Tom Smith and Wild Mercy's concerts, and hasn't stopped yet. She has served on panels about filk for both the seasoned filkers and the newcomers.

She has been hosted by many other regional conventions, including a long running history with Confluence and Filk Cons across North America. And don't forget she has signed kid's concerts at several conventions. Judi has been signing the Pegasus concerts for twenty years at The Ohio Valley Filk Fest.

Judi was chosen as an Interfilk Guest in 2006, representing the Midwest to FilkONtario 16. Her concert involved inviting guest filkers to sing and she did the ACL interpretations center stage.

What signs don't exist she improvises goodness knows what signs there are for songs like "I Had a Shoggoth". It has become a rule for the experienced performers that know her that you don't watch Judi as you perform or she will either entrance you or break you. She has an energy that leaves most performers

wondering how she keeps going, many times signing concert after concert without a break.

From the PondFilk VIII web site: "Judi combines her knowledge of ASL with an innate ability to enhance musical performances for the hearing as well. She also sings and plays guitar and is one of the nicest folks we know."

Judi has inspired several members of the filk community to learn at least some ASL. She has also inspired at least one song, "The Second Voice" by Catherine "Cat" Faber, written in 2006 after Judi's Pegasus Award Win.


ALEX BLEDSOE TOASTMASTER

"Pappy, can I be a writer?"

And with that unanswered question, asked by a 6-month-old Alex Bledsoe, to his Pappy as he sat on his lap, both smoking pipes made of furniture that their family collected, a journey began that would take Alex (a name he inherited after the family frog died.) from a small landlocked community in Tennessee all around the United States to where he now resides, Mt. Horeb, a town taken over by wooden trolls that come to life at night to celebrate the works of its most famous author: Matt Geiger.

Before he began creating worlds that God herself once said "are better than anything I've ever created," he was a reporter, a flutist, an editor, deep tissue massage expert focusing on the equine, photographer, creator of velvet paint, painter of ceramic dolls using only velvet paints that he created, inventor of "You My Guy," a little known and little loved new best-friend



service, and a door-todoor vacuum cleaner salesman. He was quite terrible at these careers and thought back to that question that his pappy never answered never would because he was tragically eaten by a wild boar while feeding the homeless. So Alex was forced to answer that question himself. And that answer was somewhat... of a yes.

Alex's creative genius, developed by many late-night games of D and D, Life, and Hungry, Hungry, Hippo, have allowed him to create characters and worlds that resonate with anyone who dares pick up one of his books. Wait, not just pick up. But read as well. His words are powerful (as proven by this quote from dead writer Charles Dickens: "Bledsoe's words are powerful.") but not powerful enough to leap off the page if someone doesn't open the book. But if someone does open the book, his words will leap off the page.



Metaphorically, of course. His most popular works, the Tufa novels, have resonated with an audience of people who view themselves as musically inclined magical faerie folk or those who love a fantastic series of stories full of musically inclined magical faerie folk. His Eddie LaCrosse books, tales of a quite witty sword jockey, have inspired comparisons to Tolkien and the writer of the Book of Tom, which was not included in the Bible because a deadline was missed. Alex has also written two bloody good vampire novels, The Girls with Games of Blood and Blood Groove. There would be a third but a different type of vampires took hold. There's still hope, though, because those vampires have entered their sparkling twilight.

Alex lives in Troll Village with his amazingly powerful yet whimsical wife Valette and their three children, who shall go unnamed because Alex and Valette, starting a new tradition that they hope will soon spread to at least 4 other families, have refused to name their children because they see labeling as inherently wrong and limiting.





IN MEMORIAM



JULIAN MAY

Author

(b.1931) died on October 17.

May entered fandom in her late teens and published the fanzineInterim Newsletter. Her first professional sale, "Dune Roller," appeared inAstoundingin 1951, including original illustrations by May.

In 1952, she chaired the TASFIC in Chicago, becoming the first woman to chair a Worldoon.

She married author Ted Dikty in 1953 and sold the story "Star of Wonder" before dropping out of science fiction and fandom for several years. With the exceptions of two episodes of the "Buck Rogers" comic strip, she focused on writing for encyclopedias and non-fiction books under a variety of pseudonyms.

In 1972, "Dune Roller" was filmed as The Cremators. She returned to science fiction in 1976 when she attended Westercon 29. The costume she wore at the convention made her start thinking about the character's background and grew into the six book Galactic Milieu series. She also wrote the four book Saga of the Pliocene Exile and collaborated on the Trillium series with Marion Zimmer Bradley and Andre Norton.

Health issues prevented May from participating in a panel with the living chairs of the other Chicago Worldcons in 2012, and in 2015 she was inducted into the First Fandom Hall of Fame.

BILL DUNBAR

died on December 4

Dunbar was an active cosplayer and Batman fan. He attended many Chicago area conventions and also performed on audiobooks.

KATHLEEN MEYER

(b.1948) died on December 13

Meyer was a long-time member of the ISFiC Board of Directors, serving as the organization's Treasurer. She chaired Windycon XI and XII in 1984-5 and Windycon XV in 1988. In 1991, Meyer chaired Chicon V, that year's Worldcon. She also worked on Capricon programming operations for several years.

LARRY SMITH

(b.1946) died on January 20

Smith co-chaired the Columbus in 1976 Worldcon bid as well as chairing Marcons III-XII. He served as a vice-chair for Chicon IV in 1982. He also co-chaired OVFF in 1998 and World Fantasy Con in 2010. In the early 1990s, he purchased Dick Spelman's book business and, along with his wife, Sally Kobee, has sold books and most conventions in the Midwest and East Coast. He has managed the dealer's room at numerous Worldcons and other conventions.

BOB BEESE

(b.1943) died on June 2

Beese was active in Illinois fandom, regularly attending Windycon and Chambanacon, and often helped concoms behind the scene. He negotiated several Windycon hotel contracts and on at least one occasion, the hotel representative pleaded with the con not to include Beese in the negotiations. He was married with author P.J. Beese.

BILL SURRETT

(b.c.1947) died on October 2

Surrett attended and volunteered at several Midwestern conventions, including Windycon, Capricon, and Chicon. He could often be seeing working in the dealers room at the various conventions.


